The Saga of 'The Water Feature'

Most visitors do not realise that there are several small ponds, three of which are large and topped up automatically or by hand, if needed. However, the rest are dry and limiting wildlife due to the water no longer being able to be pumped through the system. **Editor**


The pumps which control the water feature were switched off, as usual, at the beginning of winter in October 2019. Unfortunately, they were not able to go back on due to many extrinsic factors.

One of these factors was the installation of the new 'Buckie' which highlighted the poor state of the electrics. New electrics had to be fitted. Then Covid came along in 2020. All access to the gardens was denied and the pumps lay unattended. The system had shown that all wiring to the water feature piping was totally corroded and would need a total overhaul. Another blow to us all. At this stage, the project was still in the hands of the Council.

More bad news followed. Council funding dried up, but there was one glimmer of hope - a Nature Restoration Fund for the whole of the city for environmental projects. Again, we were subsequently scuppered - the Scottish Government decreed that this fund be used by all Councils to back up their well-publicised financial shortfalls.

However, diagrams were drawn showing electrics and water pipe routes. The costs were extensive in


comparison with our 2019 thinking! In the meantime, Michael Laird had been topping up the main pond by hose, to allow the children



Numerous meetings with the Council produced suggestions for us to try local funding. So, the long process began, with a target of £20K. Today, with the plans having been changed and a few years down the line, we are pursuing the goal of getting this project completed. On the plus side a feature relating to the ponds - the wee bridge at the upper part of the ponds, has been replaced by the Friends and is ready for the water to flow under it.

So, with lots of effort, determination and numerous applications to local trusts, we have, to date, reached the princely sum of $\mathfrak{L}13K$. So, all I can say is 'Watch this space'!

At the time of writing, we are hopeful of progress, but we wait for Council Officers to advise us further. However, I am very pleased to report that with the help of some anonymous donations, we have managed to get a new bridge built to replace the old decayed timber one. This means we will be able to cross the stream 'dry shod' when the water flows once more. We have to thank Ann Taylor for her unstinting efforts to get substantial funding towards a renovated water feature system and for the bridge.

The extreme heat this year has not been kind to some of our plants. However, most of the plants have done remarkably well. Thankfully, the rain did make an appearance just in time, ensuring the garden stayed green. Once again, we have tried to maintain the garden ready for the various events and inspections throughout the year. Visitor numbers have been down this year due to the road closure, but I am sure it will bounce back when the road opens. People have, however, been asking about the tree felling. In the spring, we sowed seeds in the green house to use in summer to help fill any empty spaces throughout the borders. These have been very handy in providing extra colour in several areas.

Personally, I have enjoyed looking at all the different shades of green and shapes of each plant throughout the year. I particularly enjoyed the yellows of the Tree Peonies, Tree Lupins, Verbascum which spread along the front, and currently the blue Agapanthus. Over the past few years, I have allowed poppies to spread naturally around the toilet building and they are now starting to make a good display in this area. The hot weather has helped to reduce weed growth which has allowed us to try to keep on top of the maintenance at times.

May: Royal Botanic Gardens, Edinburgh




The Friends' Holiday 2026
