Pupils help with Bees Bed at Duthie Park

Pupils from Abbotswell Primary School in Aberdeen visited Duthie Park to help plant flower seeds in the Bees Bed in the David Welch Winter Gardens. Pupils were provided with a variety of bee friendly plant seeds including Cosmos, Poppies, Nigella, Phacelia and Nasturtiums, most of which were donated by the Royal Horticulture Society in Scotland. To help the pupils with the planting there were a couple of volunteers from ParkForce, the Duthie Park volunteer garden group. As part of their visit to the Park, the pupils also took part in a presentation by Olya Macaulay from the Aberdeen & District Beekeepers Association on Honey Bees. Olya had taken along some combs of honey, bees wax and an observation hive, which was a huge fascination for the pupils and teachers. It is hoped the pupils will return some time over the summer months to see the seeds they planted and watch the bees in action from hives behind the Winter Gardens
