Thirdly, you are in a privileged position as you are getting to see behind the scenes of many different community projects. When you are commenting either verbally or in the written report you must remain, at all times, the 'critical friend'.

At several times during the year all the judges gather together. Firstly at annual training and award events and also at the 'debriefing' day when the judges' decisions are seen for the first time and the medal and trophy winners are finalised. You will be part of a group of experienced people with a wide range of life skills. The debates will be lively but in the end the respect each has for the others comes through. This is a long-winded way of saying you will make new friends. Yes, being a judge is hard work, but it will be one of the most satisfying things you will do (especially if the scones are good!).
