Scotland's Climate Festival Final Report 2021 - 2022



Introduction

Scotland's Climate Festival was formally launched at the beginning of November 2021, during the UN Climate Change Conference (COP26).

From the outset, Keep Scotland Beautiful aimed to put local communities at the heart of the festival, supporting them to run events that got their communities thinking about and acting on climate change.

The festival supported communities across the country to plan and deliver their own local climate festivals, alongside our national programme of events.

Alongside these community events, we ran a successful national event series that drew an audience from across the country and beyond, bringing together a diverse range of speakers and topics.

This report provides a summary of activities and achievements over the five month duration of the Climate Festival.

Programme highlights

The National Event Series encompassed critical current issues such as COP26, Women in Agriculture, The Wellbeing Economy, Year of Stories and more.

The **Community Events** programme kicked off with a parade in Falkirk during COP26 and quickly spread across the country with eco fairs, film screenings, bike rides, repair workshops, growing activities and more.

Seed Funds totaling £14,715 were disbursed to 37 groups, creating new festivals and events from Annan to Inverness to the Isle of Raasay.

The Climate Festival fostered partnerships with 14 **National Partners**, including Creative Carbon Scotland, Home Energy Scotland, SCCAN, and Scottish Wildlife Trust, with collaboration on resources and ideas for community events.



Community festivals and events

After launching in November, appetite for the Climate Festival grew with each month. Groups registered events across the country, from Annan in Dumfries & Galloway to the Isle of Raasay in the Hebrides, to Montrose in Angus. The most popular type of event by far was growing workshops and sessions, with a wide range of groups planning to get their communities involved and talking about pollinators, food security and sustainability.



Supporting communities

Project highlights included:

The Isle of Coll community in **Argyll and Bute** hosted a screening of Scotland: Our Climate Journey (which also featured in our national programme). The screening was a catalyst for considering different community projects aimed at addressing the climate emergency on Coll.

'Wear not Waste', a project based at Ashton Secondary School in **Glasgow**, aimed at recycling uniforms.. The pupils involved in the project all have additional needs and they were part of the process of collecting, repairing, labelling, and selling the clothing. This project is based in an area of economic deprivation and will help provide affordable school uniforms for families.

'Brass in the Park' was an event in **North Ayrshire**, encouraging people to use their local parks and enjoy the local heritage and green space. There was a brass band playing and stalls for environmental activists and organisations to engage with the community on climate change.

In **Dumfries & Galloway**, the group Propagate held a Seed Swap and Growers Get Together for experienced growers and beginners alike to come together and learn about seed swapping and composting, with tea and cake!

Killin Primary School in **Stirling** organised a Community Clean Up and Bike Ride, taking part in the Clean Up Scotland Spring Clean and then taking school children on a bike ride in the afternoon on National Cycle Routes – the teachers received training from Bikeability in order to run the event.

The Granton Spring Eco Fayre was an event in **Edinburgh** focused on reusing, recycling and upcycling. There were stalls for local crafters and makers, as well as workshops on upcycling, a second hand fashion show and even a creative writing workshop on spreading the environmental message.



Supporting our communities

Festival Forum

Our online Festival Forum connected climate festival and event organisers across Scotland.

Topics covered at the forum:

January: New Year's Mixer with Elaine Grant, Falkirk Delivers February: Meet the Partners with Zero Waste Scotland, Home Energy Scotland, Scottish Wildlife Trust, Creative Carbon Scotland and Scottish Communities Climate Action Network. March: Greening Events with Keep Scotland Beautiful staff.

Organiser Resources

A key aim of Scotland's Climate Festival was to enable groups that had no event experience to hold festivals and events in their community. To help them, we created a range of resources that were free and easy to access.

National Partners

Fourteen national partners provided different resources and expertise to offer community groups and inspire audiences to take action. Some partners were able to offer speakers for talks and workshops, while others were able to provide physical resources, including a fleet of bikes that could be taken to any location in Scotland!

Communications Kit

The Communications Kit was available to any group that registered an event with the festival. It included social media cards, hashtags and sample posts to enable anyone to post about their event, even if they had no social media experience.

How To Guide

To support groups with no events experience, we compiled a comprehensive <u>How To Guide</u>, which assisted groups with planning and executing an event. Over the five month duration of the festival, 158 people viewed the guide online.

National Partners



National Event Series

We produced a series of national events, which kicked off in December 2021 and were held online over the winter, with our first in-person event on 14 March 2022 at Glasgow Science Centre. Our national events were livestreamed on Eventbrite and YouTube. Hosting the events online meant we had a wide geographic reach, with audience members joining from all over the country as well as around the globe. Altogether, we had **1,482** attendees.

Events

- We kicked-off the programme on 7 December 2021 with an event After COP26, What Next? Scotland's Climate Future, reflecting on COP26 and what was to come next for Scotland.
- Our next event Food: Women on the Frontline was on 12 January, exploring the role of women in sustainable food systems, from a Scottish and Zambian perspective.
- We then held a screening of the documentary Scotland: Our Climate Journey followed by a Q&A with the filmmakers and characters from the film.
- On 16 February, Minister Lorna Slater joined us for our panel discussion on the Wellbeing Economy and its role in creating thriving communities in a changing climate.
- On International Women's Day in March, we celebrated Scotland's Year of Stories 2022 with acclaimed storytellers in our Storytelling for Change event.
- Finally, for our last event, we were delighted to partner with Glasgow Science Centre and hold a free, in person screening of **The Ants and the Grasshopper**, followed by a Q&A with filmmaker, author and activist Raj Patel.

From festival launch to the last event, we reached a growing online community, connecting people to the speakers and issues of Scotland's race to Net Zero.

Global audiences

Presenting the National Event Series online meant that we could attract attendees from across Scotland - and far beyond. National events were livestreamed on Eventbrite and YouTube, delivering over 13 hours of climate content. **700+** people have tuned in to watch these conversations on our YouTube channel and the number continues to grow.

Amplifying impact

Through the Festival Forum, our seed fund and resources provided to communities nationwide, we encouraged people across the country to take action on climate.

Our seed funded community events:

- Provided forums to start conversations about new local climate-related projects
- Supported spaces for communities to plant and access locally grown food
- Tackled litter and waste in local areas
- Encouraged active travel around neighbourhoods
- Promoted wellbeing and mental health awareness
- Connected people with their local green spaces and nature
- Created ways to recycle, reuse, and repair clothing and other items
- Gave people many more ways to get involved in tackling climate issues in their community!
