Primary 6 and our ECO Committee (P2-P7) To get to know our local area and landscape including talking to people about the area in the past and their roles in the community. To create maps of 2 local areas and compare and contrast them from January through to June, identifying local plants, trees and wildlife over the seasons. To encourage others in the school and wider community to care for our environment. To work with and involve parents and carers in our LEAF activities to get outdoors more and improve our Health & Wellbeing. To appreciate our community and the amazing walks we have around us. To hold a whole school assembly to share our LEAF journey, including film, photography and drawings with the whole school, parents and carers and our community volunteers. To continue with this project year after year with P6 classes.

We engaged with nature through the seasons, comparing our walks each month. The pupils have had hands on experiences with nature, wildlife, trees and listening to local stories about our community. We have learned about the local trees in different areas of our community and how we can now identify their leaves and how they are so important to the biodiversity of life in our community.  We also started our BIG Litter Pick with our local partner school with both ECO Committees meeting and planning the

We also managed a LIVE TEAMS MEETING from our walk in the park live to a whole school assembly, this was such great fun.  This has inspired us to create beautiful ephemeral art during our LEAF Walks and also art back in class. When looking back at our walk in February the pupils have identified the differences in the landscape, leaves, wildlife and how high the rivers and burns are on our walks.
