Our impact

Climate Action Schools supports and inspires action to combat climate change, tackle litter and waste, and create better places for nature, biodiversity and people. This report is a celebration of the achievements of children, young people and educators in schools and early years settings across Scotland during 2023 – 2024.

Here are some of the numbers:



25,000

litter picks carried out by Eco-Schools



21,125

pupils have taken part in our Climate Ready Classrooms Primary or Secondary course



Supporting the ambitions of the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals

Every school taking part in Eco-Schools links their work to one or more of the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals







We have helped young people combat climate change by:

Presenting five Climate Action Week live lessons, showcasing how Scotland is transitioning to net zero by 2045. Over 4,700 young people from across the country joined in.

Facilitating a special Q&A session with Màiri McAllan, Cabinet Secretary for Wellbeing Economy, Net Zero and Energy, giving pupils an opportunity to voice their questions and concerns about plans for the transition to net zero. 70 pupils attended in person with 500+ watching a livestream.

Delivering our Climate Ready Classrooms courses to 6,992 pupils across primary and secondary schools, providing them with information about the climate crisis focussing on solutions, actions and hope.

Developing our SCQF accredited Climate Emergency Training course to educate pupils about climate change and the positive difference they can make, and supporting secondary school teachers to deliver this.

Supporting all Eco-Schools to work on the mandatory Climate Action topic.

Training educators across the country to better understand sustainability issues and to help them increase opportunities for pupil voice.

[Now] not only has our nursery environment changed but the staff's knowledge, understanding and confidence in delivering learning for sustainability through our curriculum has increased and been enriched by our journey and the topics we have covered."

We have helped young people tackle litter and waste by:

Asking all Eco-Schools to carry out a compulsory litter pick – over 25,000 have taken place in the last 12 months.

Hosting a live lesson with ASH (taking Action on Smoking and Health) Scotland, discussing the impact of vapes on the environment and our health.

Delivering five live lessons during Spring Clean Week, including sessions focused on reducing waste from school canteens and classrooms, and asking pupils to adopt a place to look after and tell us what keeping that space litter free means to them.

Focussing on fast fashion during Sustainable Living Week including the global impacts of discarded and donated clothing.

Celebrating the efforts of young people taking part in the 2023 Litter League visiting 484 pupils at 7 schools and launching the 2024 Litter League.

Encouraging young people to take action on marine litter through the Upstream Battle® campaign including a Stem the Flow national and regional engineering competition, Source to Sea Week of Action, Marine Litter Art competition and school visits.



"We have learnt that as a school and community we can achieve a lot. We learnt also that each pupil can make a difference and that together we have a vital role in tackling problems such as litter and climate change."

We have helped young people create better places for nature, biodiversity and people by:

Rolling out the Learning About Forests (LEAF) award programme encouraging young people to reconnect with their natural environment with 60 schools currently working towards an award.

Developing our Biodiversity Action SCQF accredited course to build awareness of what positive action pupils might take to address the causes of biodiversity loss, and supporting secondary school teachers to deliver this.

Running the Pocket Garden competition which received over 100 entries, from which 30 schools from 19 local authorities were invited to grow their gardens before a public vote.

Engaging pupils with Scotland's natural environment at a local and national level during Natural Scotland Week looking at folk tales, native animals, habitats and geology.

Supporting NatureScot in developing the Nature Discovery Map Scotland resource.

Piloting a new Eco-Schools Heritage topic with three schools and asking all schools taking part in Eco-Schools to have a community focus as part of their work.

Enabling pupils to share their concerns on global and local issues that they feel strongly about through entering the Young Reporters for the Environment competition.



"It's fun being in nature, I felt happy."

Increasing participation in the Young Reporters for the Environment competition giving young people a forum to have their voices heard on environmental issues that concern them.



Growing the reach and number of pupils educated on the climate and biodiversity emergencies through our programmes and SQA accredited courses including continuing to engage local authorities to deliver the Climate Ready Classrooms programme.



Developing a progression pathway of climate and biodiversity awareness resources that build from nursery/early years through to senior phase, incorporating our programs and developing additional materials at appropriate stages.
