# Combatting climate change



The issue:

There is a climate emergency.



**Our ambition:** 

Scotland is a net zero nation.





Scotland can, and should, be a climate literate country. Everything we do to support and inspire people to make positive changes contributes to this vision. Over the past year we've continued to support Scotland's ambition of becoming net zero by increasing climate action in schools, delivering training, advice and support across sectors from local government to finance to food and drink as well as growing our support for community climate action.

For the past three decades we have celebrated and supported the remarkable achievements of children, young people and educators across the country and their commitment to Learning for Sustainability and understanding and taking positive action to address climate change and the nature crisis.

In September 2024 we began our Eco-Schools
30th anniversary celebrations with a Live Lesson
at Stirling High School with more than 300 young
people and educators joining us online and inperson. We've visited 27 schools, presenting
Eco-Committees with certificates for their
outstanding work and long-term commitment to
the international Eco-Schools programme and their
own contribution to achieving outcomes aligning
with the Scottish Government Target 2030 Action
Plan for Learning for Sustainability.

2025 saw the completion of the three-year Highland Community Waste Partnership. This network of eight community groups across the Highlands, coordinated by Keep Scotland Beautiful, and funded by The National Lottery Climate Action Fund, has had a significant, positive impact on the circular economy and waste reduction ambitions and activities of communities in the Highlands.

# Tackling litter and waste



The issue:

There is a litter emergency.



Our ambition:

Scotland is litter free and has a circular economy.





Collectively we have worked together and inspired clean up activity across large parts of Scotland. Our annual Spring Clean – the biggest mass litter picking activity in Scotland - saw an increase of more than 50% on participants from the year before and we continue to train people across the country to become 'Litterate'. We have delivered innovative campaigns to support positive behaviour change on reuse and recycling and are working on bespoke projects to improve data analysis on litter and littering behaviours.

# We have continued to support the delivery of Scotland's National Litter and Flytipping Strategy. Highlights include:

- Deploying our A9 Roadside Litter Intervention, gathering data from focus groups, surveying litter and displaying campaign materials at key locations in partnership with Perth and Kinross Council and the local community.
- Updating and promoting the online <u>Community Litter Hub</u>.
- Bringing both the Community Reference Group and the Data Group together regularly over the year to progress key actions and data collecting methodologies, as well as forming a new group to look at addressing barriers to citizen science data being used to influence policy and identify steps needed to increase its value.

WORKING TOGETHER

Our Litter League competition returned for a second year, encouraging young people across Scotland to compete for #SpringCleanScotland glory.

With almost **6,000** young people getting involved, supported by more than **1,000** adults across **30** local authorities, Hilltop Primary School won the National award while we also had six regional winners. In total these exceptional young people collected more than **2,000** bags of litter across **185** litter picks.



# NO LECTURES SORT IT, RECYCLE IT

# We're continuing our efforts to solve Scotland's issue with single-use cups through both our own campaigns and our support of others.

With **59%** of people citing some confusion or lack of understanding as reasons not to recycle single-use cups, our #TakeItBack campaign in Glasgow and Dundee aimed to solve this issue and boost recycling rates of single-use beverage cups.

#### Collaboration is a key part of our efforts to keep Scotland beautiful and we were excited to support the launch, research and development of Hubbub's Borrow Cup scheme in Glasgow.

Aiming to save **100,000** cups in just **12** weeks, the scheme is the first time in the UK that multiple major brands and local cafes have come together to create an expansive, accessible network for returnable cups.



In late 2024 we launched our Marine Litter Art Competition as part of the <u>Upstream Battle</u>® campaign, funded by Marine Fund Scotland to support the delivery of the Marine Litter Strategy. It encouraged schools from across the Clyde Valley, Ayrshire and Argyll and Bute to think about how litter dropped locally could travel to and damage the Arrochar shoreline.

Using our valued public perception and survey data we published our annual reports on the <u>public's perception</u> and <u>attitude towards litter</u>.

Additionally, we published our <u>first report</u> making the case for packaging litter to be included in regulations which would see companies that place packaging on the market contribute financially to dealing with the waste those products create.



In January 2025, we embarked on a two-year Knowledge Transfer Partnership (KTP) with the University of Stirling, funded by Innovate UK to develop Al software for detecting litter types.

Whilst the project remains in development, promotion of this work amongst stakeholders at a litter seminar in February was positively received, highlighting a real demand for innovative technology like this to help support the gathering of data intelligence to direct strategies and improve our local environment.

The University of Stirling embraces KTPs as a mechanism to help solve strategic challenges, enable the application of research in real-world settings and empowers associates to develop high-level skills and experience.

# Restoring nature and biodiversity

We have supported people across the country who want to restore nature and increase biodiversity. Over the past 12 months we have championed and supported members of our Climate and Nature Friendly Communities Network.

Our practical programmes for schools have helped reconnect young people with nature and we've continued to provide training for organisations, businesses and community groups to help them understand how to become nature positive and take action at local level.

Children across the country continue to engage with nature through our <u>Climate Action Schools</u> programme. The 2024 Pocket Garden competition received more than 100 entries with 30 chosen to bring their designs to life and grow and build their own gardens.

After **3,686** votes were cast we announced winning schools from the Western Isles, Midlothian, East Dunbartonshire and Dumfries and Galloway.

# Improving places



## The issue:

The quality of our places and spaces is declining.



### Our ambition:

Scotland's places and their heritage are restored.

We combined the expertise from our Climate Action Schools and Our Heritage, Our Future teams to launch a new Heritage topic for Eco-Schools.





Strengthening our ties to speakers and supporters of the Gaelic language, we've translated our Climate Action Schools materials and taught 350 pupils.

# Four schools took part in a pilot Heritage topic for Eco-Schools to help communities explore, record and protect their heritage.

Cumbernauld Village Family Learning Centre, St Patrick's Primary School, Falkirk High School and Ashton Secondary School investigated the heritage of their communities and used research techniques, conducted interviews and applied heritage skills to build the story of where they live and keep its heritage alive.

# Glasgow Sunflowers Baseball Club worked with us through the <u>Our Heritage</u>, <u>Our Future</u> programme, funded by Historic Environment Scotland and The National Lottery Heritage Fund, to create a scrapbook capturing the ethos of the club and its participants.

The community baseball team, a team for women, non-binary and all trans people, used the scrapbook to show how identity, sport and heritage intersect.

The document has been entered into national archives and the team was presented with one of Archaeology Scotland's Bronze Heritage Hero Awards.

#### HISTORY

<u>Green Key</u> offers comprehensive in-person audits of premises and additional support for tourism establishments to achieve continual environmental improvements and reduce their carbon footprint.

More than **40** establishments, including Gleneagles, Fairmont St Andrews and Glasgow Science Centre, now hold an international Green Key certificate and many are securing accreditation for the second year.

In collaboration with The Royal Yacht Britannia Trust we hosted a Green Key seminar on board Fingal - sharing best practice and reaffirming the importance of sustainable tourism to Scotland.

of #TeamKSB is formally accredited as Carbon Literate by the Carbon Literacy Project



Members of #TeamKSB planned two online talks and Q&A sessions. The first looked at EDI implementation and lessons learnt from our work with the British Deaf Association and the second talk shared our experiences developing a Menopause Working Group and Policy. These events were attended by delegates from a diverse range of Scottish organisations.



#### A stakeholder survey, a temperature check on our performance and influence, was issued for the first time in four years and generated more than 100 responses. Key highlights include:

- **95**% of people rated working with us as good or very good.
- **93**% of people said our expertise in the areas we worked with them on exceeded or met expectations.
- **96%** of people/organisations would recommend working with us.

# When asked if awareness of our main areas of work had increased in the last year due to our activities:

- **83**% had more awareness of climate change and the climate emergency.
- **83**% had more awareness of litter and the litter emergency.
- **77%** had more awareness of the nature emergency.
- **81%** had more awareness of what can be done to improve places for people and nature.

# Our 2025/2026 ambitions

"This year marks a significant milestone for Keep Scotland Beautiful as we celebrate our 25th anniversary as a Scottish charity. To mark the occasion, we have launched £25 for 2025, our public giving campaign to raise funds to ensure we are able to respond to the priorities of communities and organisations who are committed to environmental action.

# Our focus on the coming year includes:

#### **Ambitious project delivery**

- Our Climate Action Schools programme will continue to support the Scottish Government's strategic priorities including the implementation of Target 2030 Action Plan for Learning for Sustainability.
- We'll push forward work to inspire community heritage and climate action and widen engagement with heritage across Scotland thanks to funding through The National Lottery Heritage Fund and Historic Environment Scotland.

- Our valued campaigns to engage people in collecting data and carrying out litter picks #SpringCleanScotland and Upstream Battle® will remain a priority and we will continue to take action and campaign to reduce the consumption of, and littering of single-use items such as beverage cups and vapes.
- Our national awards for beaches, parks and the tourism sector will continue to provide a benchmark for excellent environmental management for people and nature.

### Influencing policy

- Using state of the art technology, and improved citizen science data, we will continue to evidence the urgent need for greater, more targeted action across our strategic objectives.
- We'll engage with all parties ahead of the 2026 Scottish general election, presenting our manifesto for change, particularly to raise the profile of the urgent need to address our litter emergency.
- Our work to engage with UK Government, through DEFRA, and with support of devolved governments and local authorities, will continue as Extended Producer Responsibility for packaging and a UK Deposit Return System finally becomes a reality.
- We will monitor closely the impact on litter of the forthcoming ban on single-use vapes, and potential charge on single-use cups.
