### **New Gate Locking Procedure**

As you are aware the Association has implemented a new gate locking procedure following previous failures with the padlock. The gate should continue to be closed after every entry and exit but not locked between 8am and 6pm, hanging the padlock on the sliding bar to help protect it from damage. Between these hours if you believe you are the last person on site when exiting then please err on the side of safety and lock the gate if you are unsure. Outwith these hours the gate should be locked at all times on entry and exit.

### **Green Flag Award**

Hot off the press we have been informed that now that lockdown has started to ease we will be inspected again for our Green Flag Award. Remember to play your part by keeping your plot and our site in tip top condition!



### **The Allotment Market Stall (TAMS)**

The Allotment Markets Stall (TAMS) has started again this year from the 24 July and will run through to 3 October. TAMS was set up in 2013 to sell the excess produce from the allotment sites across Aberdeen. Allotment holders are asked to donate their spare crops which will be collected every Thursday afternoon and then sold with some of the profit donated back to allotment sites to allow us to maintain and improve our sites. This includes Slopefield. This year TAMS will be running three stalls every Friday morning at Duthie, Seaton and Victoria Parks.

If you have any excess produce you would like to donate to TAMS then please harvest your crops and leave them in the blue container opposite the notice board by 1pm every Thursday. Remember by donating your excess produce you will help invest in the future of Slopefield. Any unsold produce is donated to local foodbanks or community projects.

### **Terry's Tips**

You can still sow plenty of crops at Slopefield in August but it is better to do it sooner rather than later. It's an ideal time to sow leafy crops, particularly those that tend to bolt and go to flower in hot weather such as Lettuce, Mustard, Mizuna, Rocket, Spring Onion and Lambs Lettuce. Be prepared however if the weather turns cool to cover your crops with a polythene grow tunnel or cloche to keep them productive.

Spinach is also a great crop to sow at this time of year with a number of varieties of winter spinach that will provide you with leafy greens throughout the colder months. These can be sown direct in the soil or started off in modules in a cold frame and planted out later.

By mid August french and runner beans will be in full swing. You should harvest regularly picking the beans whilst they are small and tender before they grow too large. If your plants grow too tall nip out the growing point once they reach the top of the canes and all the energy will be put into production of the beans.

The same applies to Courgettes, pick regularly and they will keep on coming. If you leave the fruits too long larger crops inhibit the production of more fruit. You may wish to put some straw under your fruits particularly if it has been raining to prevent them rotting. They can also rot at their base if pollination wasn't completed (usually associated with poor weather at flowering time which puts off the bees) or the plant has set too many fruits and is aborting some.

August also means bulb time at the Garden Centre. Get there early to ensure that you have the pick of the best varieties and biggest bulbs. Give the bulbs a quick squeeze. If they feel soft and mushy then discard as they won't flower and will rot in the soil.
